Sternfeld, Roberts, Koster, Killgrove: More on Latin squares and configurations, Congressus Numerantium 176(2005)69-88 defines the directed graph called a local motion, the ALMI invariant, i.e. if two Latin have different ALMI then they lie in different main classes, and shows that the ALMI together with transversal count (almit) is a complete invariant for Latin squares of orders 3, 4, 5, 6, 7. However, when applied to the order 8 main class representatives from Brendan McKay's website (http://cs.anu.edu.au/ bdm/data/latin.html) we find 49 pairs of squares such that the squares in each pair have identical almit.
